PROGRAMS

• *Safeguarding the Arab world's audiovisual heritage*

In Cooperation with University College London - Qatar and the British Library-Qatar Foundation Partnership.

- ❖ Organize a seminar: *Before It Is Too Late: Protecting and Preserving Arab Audiovisual Heritage* to mark the World Day for Audiovisual Heritage on 27 October 2019.

The seminar emphasized the urgency of efforts to preserve the unique audiovisual heritage of Qatar and the Middle East on a large scale by finding collaborative solutions and sharing expertise.

The event includes:

1. A lecture: “The Gulf and the Arab Audiovisual Heritage: The Urgency and the Possibilities of Preservation,” by Hazem Jamjoum, British Library
2. A panel discussion: “Preserving Our Audiovisual Heritage: Challenges and Opportunities”, with the participation of Shayya AlFadel, Abdul Salam Jadallah and Pamela Erskine-Loftus



The United Nations has designated 27 October as the World Day for Audiovisual Heritage aimed at building global awareness of the urgency and importance of preserving audiovisual materials such as sound recordings and moving images. These are among the most vulnerable types of heritage materials, due to the use of rapidly deteriorating materials in the construction of carriers and the impending obsolescence of playback machines, particularly for materials recorded on magnetic tape. A great deal of effort and care is required in order to preserve the marvelous 20th-century accomplishments of Arab cinema, television, radio and music industries for future generations.

❖ ***Organize 2 Webinars: Protecting our sound and audiovisual heritage [23-24 June 2020]***

(1): A brief history of audio recording

The session discussed the history of audio recording formats, from the 1857 phonautograph to 21st-century digital formats, and the most common audio carriers in the Middle East, with particular attention to the commercial music industry and radio in the region.

• ***Supporting Documentary Heritage Preservation in the Arab Region***

In collaboration with UNESCO (June 2018 – June 2020)

Representatives from libraries and cultural institutions from across the Middle East and North Africa joined international experts to discuss key issues relating to heritage preservation in the region at a high-level conference, which was jointly organized by Qatar National Library and the United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization (UNESCO) on 1 and 2 December 2019.

One of the highlights of the conference was the agreement of the participants to a *“Declaration to Support Preservation of Documentary Heritage in the Arab region,”* calling for action on all levels to raise the standards of conservation and care of documentary heritage based on regional and global best practices.



❖ ***The training on, “Collection management and documentation technique”, Jordan, 2 – 5 March 2020***

UNESCO and IFLA PAC – Qatar jointly organized a four-day capacity-building course to support documentary heritage institutions in the Arab region. The training on “Collection Management and Documentation Techniques”

Hosted by Abdul Hameed Shoman Foundation in Amman, Jordan, the training took place from 2 – 5 March 2020, and was attended by 18 documentary heritage practitioners from Algeria, Iraq, Jordan, Lebanon, Libya, Mauritania, Morocco, Oman, Palestine, Qatar, Sudan and Yemen.

The training on “Collection Management and Documentation Techniques” focused on best practices concerning documentation procedures such as entry, exit and loans procedures, labelling, cataloguing, and movement control. It included both theoretical and practical sessions, aiming to enhance the skills of the participants in managing documentation procedures manuals and setting up collection management plans to ensure safe, secure and effective management in heritage collections.

6. Intelligence and Strategic Information scanning system
7. Cross-cooperation with other organizations
8. Outreach and communication campaign

❖ *Participate in the annual World Customs Organization (WCO) Enforcement Committee meeting*

Stephane Ipert, Director of the IFLA PAC Centre for Arab Countries and the Middle East, spoke at the World Customs Organization (WCO) in Brussels, Belgium, where he presented the activities of the IFLA PAC Centre in fighting the trafficking of manuscripts, books and archives in the Middle East and North Africa (MENA) region.

Ipert's presentation, given during the annual WCO Enforcement Committee meeting hold on 24 February 2020, highlighted the specific actions foreseen for the period 2020-2021, which the

IFLA PAC Centre at the library will undertake. These include launch of Himaya project, an international seminar, which will take place in the coming months at the library and collaboration with the WCO on a course for customs employees in Doha.

❖ ***Webinar: Fighting the trafficking and illegal circulation of documentary heritage: [7 July 2020] in Arabic & English (simultaneous translation was provided)***

For several years, the trafficking and smuggling of heritage items from libraries and archives have been rising. In the MENA and West and Central Africa regions, this phenomenon is greater due to the number of nations suffering from conflict and upheaval. Moreover, trafficking may be linked to criminal and terrorist groups, which use it as a means to increase their income and launder money.



The various international organizations in charge of countering the trafficking of artifacts have been focused on the illegal circulation of archaeological and artistic items. Little has been done until now with respect to documentary heritage, which is even more at risk because it is less protected by national legislation and is easier to move illegally. In this webinar we discussed and presented these specific issues and challenges, in addition to the "Himaya" project suggested by Qatar National Library to support efforts to counter the trafficking and illegal circulation of the documentary heritage.

Work with main institutional partners to build the project and making it efficient on the ground and in MENA region

- **The Qatari committee for MoW program (UNESCO)**

Work with the Qatari National Committee for Education, Culture and Science to activate the Memory of the World program in Qatar, and the PAC center staff are members in the first established National committee of MoU program.

The Qatari Committee for Education, Culture and Science is in charge of the organization this committee. A first e-meeting has been organized the 17-05-2020, with the general secretary of the Qatari Committee for Education, Culture and Science, some representatives of the MoCS and the team of the QNL IFLA PAC center. This group of professionals and experts forms the composition of this MoW committee.

Roles of the committee:

This committee has the following missions:

- Advocating for the preservation and the valorization of documentary heritage in Qatar
 - Relations with the MoW national committees in the MENA region and especially in the Gulf region; relations with the regional committees and with Unesco office in Paris headquarter in charge of MoW program
 - Management of all the actions related to the Qatari National register for MoW.

- Support the local community through the “**Ask for technical advice**” service on our website, which gives technical advice and allows us to reply to questions related to preservation and conservation of local heritage collections.
 - Support local institutions (museums, libraries, etc.) and give them free attendance to our workshops and training courses.
 - Offer tours for schools and university students in the Preservation and Conservation Laboratories and Heritage Library.
 - Promote our PAC center activities through media, newspapers locally and regionally, social media and TV channels to highlight the importance of preservation and conservation.

QNL hosts training program for conservation experts from Iraq

Qatar National Library in collaboration with the Ministry of Culture and Sports, recently concluded an intensive training program for a delegation of conservation experts from the Republic of Iraq.

The sessions focused on preserving documentary heritage in libraries and cultural institutions in the Middle East.

The training, which was also attended by library specialists from the Ministry of Culture and Sports who are based at the Library, is part of the International Federation of Library Associations and Institutions (IFLA) Regional Preservation and Conservation Program for Arab Countries and the Middle East.

Experts from the Library shared best practices during a series of practical sessions focusing on the science of conserving and preserving the manuscripts and collections of heritage libraries. Participants also got the chance to experiment with the latest equipment and technologies in the Library's Conservation Lab, which are used in the restoration, maintenance and study of cultural institutions in the region.



The sessions focused on preserving documentary heritage in libraries and cultural institutions in the Middle East.

"In our role as IFLA's Regional Preservation and Conservation Center for the Arab region, we work closely with institutions in Qatar and beyond to work with us to find sustainable solutions for preserving the rich documentary heritage of the region," added Jaber.

The training program also included theoretical lectures on the importance of preserving Islamic manuscripts and the digitization of heritage collections; a detailed explanation of digitization processes conducted at the Library; risk management and evaluation in libraries; and the key elements that should be available in the evaluation and response plans.

Qatar National Library hosted a training program for library specialists from Jordan this year in collaboration with UNESCO Office in Amman, and a training program for a group of experts from the National Library currently underway in cooperation with Qatar's Ministry of Culture and Sports.

- ***The training program, “Practical Methods for the Scientific Examination of Library Objects”, Lebanon, [3-6 February 2020]***



Experts from libraries, cultural institutions and museums from across the Levant participated in a four-day training program, held **from 3 to 6 February 2020**, organized by Qatar National Library in Jounieh, Lebanon, in cooperation with the Holy Spirit University of Kaslik and the Beit Gazo Center. The primary focus of the first two days was technical photography. Conservators take a collection of images using a modified digital camera and different lighting sources and filters, with each image providing unique information about the object under examination.

The identification of pigments in manuscripts and paintings with a portable device that uses reflectance spectroscopy technology engaged participants on day three, and the program concluded on day four with practical training on technical photography and reflectance spectroscopy using heritage manuscripts held in the building's archives.



- ***Online workshop via Microsoft Teams titled Preservation and Conservation of Manuscripts: Founding Introductions, [8-9 June 2020]***

The lecturers in this course are experts from the Manuscript Restoration Center at the Al-Abbas Holy Shrine Library in Iraq.

This event is part of the continuing efforts of the IFLA PAC regional center at Qatar National Library to create a professional network of collaborative assistance to exchange knowledge and learn about successful experiences toward the preservation of documentary heritage throughout the region.
