Extend the roles and impact of librarians working in global and disaster health, including a focus on delivery of the UN Sendai Framework on Disaster Risk Reduction

<p><b>1. Strengthen the Global Voice of Libraries:</b> Librarians are often not involved in strategic planning and country-led DRR (disaster risk reduction), we will seek to increase the visibility of librarians in this field, and showcase their impact, by working with partners and stakeholders in international organisations to advocate for their potential role.</p> <p><b>3. Connect and Empower the Field:</b> we will use virtual, and face-to-face meetings, and virtual learning interventions to help ensure that librarians have the skills and capabilities to respond to new and emerging roles in DRR and global health, learning from the experiences of Covid-19, and to make sure that opportunities are targeted at areas of most need. We will harness existing evidence and best practice through collaborative approaches, training and mentoring.</p>
